Committee members,

Please accept this cover letter and appended materials as my self-nomination to the Multi-stakeholder Forum of the Canadian Government Civil Society Network.

I have worked with government information in libraries since 1998, when I was hired by the Edmonton Public Library to process and provide reference services for their government collections. My subsequent career as a Government Information Librarian in academic libraries included research with and stewardship of Canadian government information. Over the course of almost twenty years, I have taught university students to work with Census data and parliamentary publications, assisted professors with ATIP requests and research projects, and provided countless conference presentations and training sessions in a range of venues. I bring frontline experience and evidence-based observations to the open government conversation.

Working with national and international professional associations was instrumental to my success establishing the Canadian Government Information Digital Preservation Network, an open access project that received the Canadian Library Association OCLC Award for Innovative Technology in 2015. Librarians who work with government information (be it data, documents, or publications) understand that these resources have enduring value and maximum impact when accessible in an open environment. Contributing to the civic engagement requirement of open government is one way I can continue my work in this area.

Access to government information is one of the pillars of a liberal democracy and its stewardship is affected by changes in government policy and publishing practices. The precarious nature of these politically sensitive programs has led me into the unanticipated role of advocate for open and perpetual access to these resources. In addition to presenting and occasionally writing on this topic, I initiated [e-petition 1116](#), which calls on the Government of Canada to place government works in the public domain. As the number of signatories was almost triple the required threshold for certification, this petition is now scheduled for tabling in the House of Commons sometime during the week of October 16-20.

Openness is a value, like diversity, and in this context can serve the public good by inspiring the creation of new works and by minimizing democratic deficits. As I have become more active with the open access, open education, and Creative Commons communities I have come to appreciate the synergy between these groups and open government initiatives. Working together will serve to strengthen the evolving information ecosystem and the democratic values this system can support and inspire.

As you will see from my CV, I have been making my presentation materials openly available for many years and continue to be committed to working in a transparent and accountable way.
